"So now that you know God (or should I say, now that God knows you), why do you want to go back again and become slaves once more to the weak and useless spiritual principles of this world?"

Galatians 4:9

ebruary is Black History Month. It is a time to remember African American sacrifices and heroism throughout history. One such movement was the Underground Railroad. Prior to the Civil War, organized abolitionists were aided by the loosely interconnected Underground Railroad. But it was neither underground nor a railroad. It was a secret network of antislavery leaders and freed blacks. It included secret routes and safe houses from Georgia to Canada. Between the peak years of 1830 and 1865, it helped as many as one hundred thousand fugitive slaves escape to freedom.

The Underground Railroad was a dangerous but effective way to help slaves escape their life in the South. Through a secret network of safe houses ("stations") run by "stationmasters," the "conductors" helped to guide the slaves along their journey. The destinations were in northern states where slavery had been abolished, as well as places in the far West, Canada, Mexico, and the Caribbean. If caught, the punishment was swift and harsh. But because freedom was so precious, the risks were worth it. There was no turning back.

As people enslaved by sin, we have also been offered an escape route. The destination is God's eternal kingdom, but the reward also includes a life of freedom in Jesus for the here and now. This plan is not dangerous for us, but it was certainly costly for Jesus. Our freedom was and is so precious to our Savior that the risks and price were worth His coming to this world to achieve it. And for us, that freedom is such a precious gift, why would we "want to go back again and become slaves once more"? After we remember the past, let us rejoice in His freedom today!
