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A Christmas Love Song

o you have a favorite Christmas song? If yes, consider the reasons why it is your favorite. And if you have curated a Christmas playlist, what if

said playlist was a list of love songs to God? In scripture, songs have a special place. According to Kranz, there are at least 185 songs in scripture. Some of them poems or lyrics set to music. They address topics like battles, coronations, funerals, and God's miracles. Most are found in the Book of Psalms. Significant songs include Moses and Miriam's song, or the songs of David's victory and deliverance. Intriguing are the songs in Revelation, like chapter 5 "Worthy is the Lamb," or chapter 15 the "Song of Moses" and the "Song of the Lamb." How about Revelation chapter 14 and the song only the 144,000 know?

But the song we should be reminded of today is Mary's Song. Luke 1:35, "And the angel answered and said to her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God." Mary is to give birth to the coming Messiah, and she has humbly embraced her role.

However, consider her troubling circumstances of being single and pregnant. What about support for a baby much less a future king? How about the criticisms of society? In spite of these challenges, Mary breaks into a joyful song. Luke 1:46-47, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit has rejoiced in God my Savior." Mary's heart is full of God's love even to the point of overflowing. Have you ever been so full of joy that you couldn't help but sing? Mary's song can give us encouragement today. In verses 46 and 47, Mary puts the all-important

focus on God. Notice the self-esteem of Mary in verses 48 and 52, God has "regarded the lowly state of His maidservant; for behold, henceforth all generations will call me blessed," and He has, "exalted the lowly." Her sense of identity flows from God.

Mary's song causes us to think on the mightiness of God, His holiness, His mercy, His arm strength, verses 49-51. These are awesome characteristics. We should take a few moments even now to praise God for these attributes.

There are a few more themes to think on. The first is the theme of humility. Mary saw herself as a humble servant of the Lord. Another theme is God's mercy. He desires to help His people, verse 50 and 54. Yet another theme is the justice of God, verses 51-53.

What a profound and inspiring love song! The song of Mary can minister to us today during the troubling and awesome experience of end times. And through Mary's unusual experience she worships God with song. So can we. And we should. We might need to delete a few songs from our Christmas playlist and perhaps add a few more.

Are you experiencing confusion and perplexity like Mary? Are you having anxieties regarding the short-term and long-term difficulties? Are the negative voices and criticisms around you overwhelming? I invite you to humble yourself before God and let the character of Jesus gestate within you. Perhaps your life would turn into a love song to Jesus.

Mary was able to sing a love song to God because God had given her The Song; that song is Jesus. Jesus is the embodiment of God's love song to a sin-sick world. In turn, let us sing a Christmas love song to Him!

Sin embargo, con la incertidumbre económica mundial, vista en una creciente inflación, altos precios de las energías y la incertidumbre de una posible confrontación bélica de gran escala, ¿tendremos el ánimo y la economía para hacer las celebraciones que tradicionalmente se hacían?

Entendiendo que la inflación económica es la pérdida de poder adquisitivo del dinero visto en un encarecimiento de valor de los productos de consumo, de los intereses y otros servicios, lo que conlleva a comprar menos, pero con mayor gasto. Por otro lado, la incertidumbre es un estado de inseguridad o estar a la espera de algo que puede afectar la vida negativamente, generando una sensación de ansiedad.

Para algunos esta navidad será las más fría que han pasado en años, ya sea porque estarán limitados en el uso de comodidades, calefactores, luces, etc., otros estarán fuera de sus hogares, enfrentados a la dura realidad de ser refugiados o inmigrantes. Para todos aquellos que estén en situaciones similares recomiendo dos textos bíblicos que pueden ayudar a levantar fortalecer nuestro espíritu.

El primero de ellos es Isaías 43: 2: "Cuando pases por las aguas, yo estaré contigo; y si por los ríos, no te anegarán. Cuando pases por el fuego, no te quemarás, ni la llama arderá en ti". distinctly remember the Christmas when my mom, during our annual family gift exchange, handed my cousin this shiny, beautifully wrapped box for him to open. Like most impatient but wildly excited children on Christmas morning, my little cousin ripped the wrapping paper off, threw it somewhere behind himself, and stared with big eyes at the medium sized box in his hands. Eagerly, he took the top of the box off, dug his hands inside and with all the disdain he could muster up, exclaimed "Earmuffs?!", and proceeded to toss his gift to the side. He had assumed, as many of us do, that the packaging would reflect the package itself... and in his mind, earmuffs didn't quite cut it. Well... his perspective on that gift changed pretty quick after about 20 minutes of playing in the snow without anything to keep his ears warm.

I think we often find ourselves doing the same thing as we enter the holiday season. We expect our Christmases to be wrapped in Christmas carols, holiday sales, and matching pajama sets, because isn't that what anyone would expect on Christmas? Isn't it supposed to be the "most wonderful time of the year?" So, when life throws us a curve ball, or maybe a lump of coal in the form of one less place setting at the table this year, or maybe we've found ourselves laid off right before the holidays, we get upset because "this isn't what we thought Christmas was going to be like this year." It's not what we expected it to be, so we toss it to the side... next year will be better. But what if the most precious gift we could get this Christmas didn't look like what we thought it would?

You know, having their baby born in a stable and having to lay Him in a manger was probably not the way Mary and Joseph imagined welcoming their first-born child, their gift, into the world. Then again, nothing about the way this child came to be was conventional, was it? His earthly context didn't really seem to give much insight into His purpose, but still, His identity and mission, His worth never changed. This baby boy, not born in a palace, yet still born as royalty. Not born surrounded by servants, but as a servant. A child who received wondrous gifts from the Magi, yet coming to give the greatest gift of all. The King of Kings not wrapped in regal, purple satin... but wrapped in swaddling clothes? That doesn't seem like an entrance fit for the Most High, but the angel in Luke 2 tells the shepherds, "This will be a sign for you: You will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." The sign wasn't the bright star in the sky or the gifts from the wise men. It was just the baby. It was just Jesus. And you know what? It didn't matter what He was wrapped in. He was perfect. He was enough.

This Christmas, even if your current context might not look like much, or maybe your holiday season is turning out to be more unconventional than you planned, remember that the packaging doesn't always reflect the worth of the gift. I believe that Jesus has something special for you this season, but it might not be the biggest or shiniest package under the tree. Who knows? Maybe it will be a pair of earmuffs. I can promise this one thing, though. Because it's coming from Him, it won't matter what it's wrapped in.
