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hen they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted" (Mt 28.17). I find this line fascinating for it brings into our horizon the reality of doubt. Here are the eleven, having experienced all that we have

read in Matthew's gospel (and so much more), seen a resurrected Messiah, and now with him atop a familiar mountain...and their response initially is doubt. There is no chastisement. No shaming. No condemnation. There is doubt-and worship. This presents a dilemma for many. According to this passage those closest to Jesus could doubt and worship. What does this reveal about our way of understanding following Jesus? What does this suggest about the way we understand doubt? What does this suggest about the way we understand worship? And this follows Jesus' resurrection. There can exist in the inner worlds of some of the eleven doubt despite resurrection. A post-resurrection world includes the presence of doubt. And yet, doubt does not have the last word. Worship does. And I am so encouraged by this. Following Jesus does not mean understanding all things. Following Jesus means living with unsettled questions. The presence of doubt does not indicate a lack of faith. I wonder if maturing in Jesus includes this capacity to live in the tension of doubt and worship. Experiencing the unfolding fullness of Jesus in life doesn't eliminate questions but places us in powerful spaces to still worship while we carry the doubt. Jesus will speak into those doubts. He will remind us of mission while we wrestle with doubt. He will remind us authority does not reside in us but in Him. He will remind us that while these doubts may exist, questions may arise, wonder may atrophy, that we are not alone. He journeys with us. He remains. He abides. And we can go from that place of doubt and worship to minister to a society and world filled with doubts and self-worship. We can go.
